At WIDC 2005

New Zealand's Gaylene Preston (Perfect Strangers), awardwinning feature film and television director, will mentor this year's participants in taking risks, developing their own unique style and testing original material in a safe educational environment. The WIDC program builds confidence and releases creativity by fostering a team-spirit approach to dramatic storytelling for screen.

PHASE ONE During an intensive Story Incubation Module (SIM) in December, led by a senior story editor, participants examine the elements of story telling during one-on-one and group sessions on story structure, improving dialogue, and taking a unique psychological approach to character development. Scripts are honed for production at the WIDC PPPM the following January.

PHASE TWO During the Prep, Production and Post Production Module (PPPM) in January / February participants explore aspects of working with actors; delve into working with the cinematographer, camera, lenses and styles of blocking for camera. They look at key aspects of production design and post-production, casting, rehearsing, leading and communicating through classroom and hands-on exercises with the actors and crew.

PHASE THREE The PPPM continues with the emphasis on process over product, each participant directs and edits an original MAIN Scene. Keeping the learning goals of the directors at the forefront, participants receive coaching and mentorship from WIDC's seasoned faculty and support team while they take $% \left\{ 1\right\} =\left\{ 1$ their work from pre-production, through production and postproduction. Participants leave the PPPM with a not-for-broadcast copy of their work for personal analysis, a variety of new contacts, and applied knowledge of industry practices.

PHASE FOUR Director graduates are supported in their short and long-term career plans and all participants become part of the WIDC Alumnae Network.

Gaylene Preston, recently

awarded the Officer of the New Zealand Order of Merit by the New Zealand Governor-General, has been celebrated as one of New Zealand's best-loved filmmakers, having made some of the most enduring popular classics of New Zealand cinema. Her feature films including *Perfect Strangers* with Sam Neill,

Bread and Roses, Ruby and Rata, and Mr. Wrong have garnered multiple awards in New Zealand and abroad. She is equally at home making documentaries. Highlights include the feature documentary, War Stories Our Mothers Never Told Us' which was in official selection for Venice and Sundance Film Festivals and All The Way Up There, Special Jury Prize, Banff Mountain Film Festival. She is a story-teller whose films have a distinctive flavour, which entertain while presenting serious subjects with humour and warmth. Her compassion and understanding of real life, real people, combined with her immense talent for portraying on film real stories, makes Gaylene a New Zealand film industry icon. She is the first filmmaker to receive a NZ Arts Foundation Laureate Award. WIDC participants will also benefit from Gaylene's knowledge of producing and building audiences since her films have been both self distributed in "four-wall" fashion and by traditional distributors in the US markets.

WIDC Personnel

A team of seasoned professionals offers individual and group sessions on a variety of topics tailored to each participant's individual learning plan.

Carol Whiteman Creative Women Workshops co-founder, President & CEO and WIDC co-creator is a two-time Governor General's Award nominee. Whiteman produces and facilitates the workshop, conducts one-on-one meetings with participants, as well as post-workshop coaching and follow-up.

Peg Campbell (MENTOR STORY EDITOR) an award-winning documentary and narrative film director/producer (*Street Kids, In Search of the Last Good Man*), associate professor of advanced film production and script writing at Emily Carr Institute of Art and Design, co-founder of Women In Film and Video Vancouver, Cineworks, the Independent Film and Video Alliance and Creative Women Workshops, is a WIDC co-creator. Campbell leads sessions on story structure and character analysis, funding and career planning.

Christianne Hirt (MENTOR ACTOR) star of film (*For the Moment* with Russell Crowe, *Heart of the Sun*) and television productions (*Lonesome Dove – The Series*), is a co-founder of the Company of Rogues Actors Studio and one of the foremost instructors of the Meisner technique in Canada. She is a director alumna (1998) of WIDC and has a feature film and television series project in development with Rogue Films Canada. At WIDC she leads sessions on working with actors and how to coach dynamic and credible performances.

Roger Vernon and Peter Wunstorf (MENTOR DIRECTORS OF PHOTOGRAPHY), both highly respected Canadian cinematographers whose work has garnered numerous nominations and awards, Vernon (Unforgiven, Alive, Mystery Alaska) and Wunstorf (The Grocer's Wife, Double Happiness, Smallville, the pilot) lead technical sessions on camera, lenses, blocking and camera choreography, and leading a crew. Past guest DOPs have included, Richard Leiterman, Greg Middleton, John Clothier and Dean Bennett.

Carolyn Mamchur (GUEST INSTRUCTOR, SIM) is a professor at Simon Fraser University in BC, an award-winning author and a popular speaker at PRAXIS, Centre for Screenwriters. Her collected works include psychology texts (including *A Meeting of Minds, A Teacher's Guide to Cognitive Type Theory and Learning Style*), articles, papers, children's books and ten feature film scripts (including *Arousal* based on a Barbara Gowdy story for Back Alley Films and a half-hour drama for CBC). At the Story Incubation Module (SIM) she will present thought-provoking sessions on character analysis and development using Personality Type and Temperament Theory.

Sara Diamond Director of Research, The Banff Centre, and Artistic Director/Executive Producer, Media & Visual Arts, The Banff Centre, Bell Canada Award winner, Creative Women Workshops co-founder and WIDC co-creator, presents a session on new media content creation, funding and career planning.

Sandra Richmond, Partner, McMillan Binch, conducts a session about the issues of Ownership, Copyright and General Entertainment Law following the workshop.

Mentor Editor (TBA) a senior Editor will lead discussions about the theories and traditions of picture editing and how to bend the rules in new and creative ways. She also provides mentoring to the editors at the workshop.

ADDITIONAL GUEST SPEAKERS (TBA) offer constructive feedback on the director participants' work and a perspective on current production trends in Canada in a session on: The Landscape for Canadian Women Directors.



ELIGIBILITY

The directing ensemble will include qualified candidates from diverse backgrounds, ethnicities, ages, and regions of Canada. You could be one of the eight director participants selected by a nationally representative jury of film, television and video professionals, if you are a Canadian woman with:

- A recognized track record directing low budget dramatic films, television or video projects (long or short form),
- A recognized track record directing documentary, experimental video, television specialty format, etc.
- Some directing experience, crossing over to directing with a recognized set of highly transferable skills (a performer, producer, writer, AD, etc.).

Any combination of these skills and attributes will be considered.

Actor Scholarships

The WIDC Workshop creates a safe place where actors can interact with directors as well as other creative personnel and elements that can influence the actor's craft. Actors give and receive feedback, learn from each other, and share information about what's going on for actors regionally and nationally. Actors leave the program with a deeper understanding of their craft and a new set of professional contacts.

Ten actors are selected, primarily based on the casting needs of

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the MAIN Scenes being shot by the directors. Selected with the assistance of professional casting personnel the acting ensemble consists of as broad a representation of regions, ethnicities and backgrounds as possible and is dedicated to helping director participants develop new and better ways of communicating with actors. Actors' economy return travel, accommodations and meals at The Banff Centre, plus a \$75/workshop day honorarium is covered by the workshop. You must be an ACTRA member in good standing to be eligible.

Crew Scholarships

The crew is made up of professional technicians and crafts people, as well as volunteers who fill apprentice/assistant positions as work studies. Professional crew can practice their craft in a supportive environment where they can stretch their creative muscles. Providing mentorship for the work study crew members, professional crew members also practice their leadership and communication skills. Work study crew members receive hands-on production experience, as well as one-onone and group instruction. With access to a variety of levels of production, all crew members leave the program creatively charged and revitalized, with new professional connections.

Union crew members are selected by the organizers with the assistance of the sponsoring craft and technical unions/guilds.

Positions available include: 1st ADs, Directors of Photography, Camera Operators, Editors, Electrics, Grips, Make-up/Hair Artists, Production Sound Technicians, Script Supervisors and Set Decorators. Professional crew's economy return travel, accommodations and meals at The Banff Centre, plus a \$75/ workshop day honorarium are provided by the workshop.

Work study crew members are selected with the assistance of sponsoring institutions. Positions available include: Trainee AD/PAs, 2nd Camera Assistants, Grip/Electric Swings, Sets, Props, Wardrobe, Sound Boom Operators. Scholarships are provided by sponsoring post secondary institutions and regional agencies for work study crew members tuition, travel, meals and shared accommodations costs.
