Garth Howard Drabinsky was born in Toronto in 1949. He received his LL.B. from the University of Toronto in 1973, and was called to the Ontario Bar with Honours in 1975. He developed a successful entertainment law practice and his textbook, *Motion Pictures and the Arts in Canada - The Business and the Law*, published by McGraw Hill Ryerson in 1976, became a standard reference work.

In 1979, Mr. Drabinsky co-founded, with Nat Taylor, Cineplex Corporation, which became Cineplex Odeon Corporation with the purchase of Canadian Odeon Theatres in 1984. Cineplex Odeon grew to become one of North America's largest film exhibition companies. Mr. Drabinsky served as President from 1980, Chief Executive Officer from 1982 and Chairman of the Board from 1986. Under Mr. Drabinsky's leadership, the Corporation grew over ten years from an 18-screen cinema complex at Toronto's Eaton Centre into a chain of cinemas with some 1800 screens in 500 locations, including six Canadian provinces, 20 American states, the District of Columbia and the United Kingdom. Various divisions within the Corporation included Canada's largest independent film distribution company (Cineplex Odeon Films), Canada's largest motion picture laboratory and post-production sound and editing facility (Film House) and The Live Entertainment Division–formed in 1988–purchased in 1989 by Messrs. Drabinsky and Myron I. Gottlieb and re-established as Live Entertainment of Canada Incorporated and later known as Livent Inc.

Mr. Drabinsky demonstrated his creative insight into the movie business as producer of a number of successful motion pictures. From 1977 to 1981, he produced six films, five of them in association with his film production partner Joel B. Michaels, including "The Silent Partner," with Elliott Gould and Christopher Plummer, winner of six 1978 Canadian Film Awards, including "Best Picture of the Year," "The Changeling" starring George C. Scott, winner in 1980 of eight Genie Awards, including "Best Picture" and "Tribute" with Jack Lemmon and Lee Remick, for which Mr. Lemmon received an Academy Award nomination in 1981. In 2003 he produced *The Gospel of John*.

Mr. Drabinsky's live theatre career began in 1977 when he co-produced Tom Stoppard's award-winning drama "Travesties" at Toronto's St. Lawrence Centre. In 1981, he served as Chairman of the celebrated Toronto International Theatre Festival and in 1988 he co-produced the Broadway production of "Macbeth" starring Christopher Plummer and Glenda Jackson.

From 1993 to 1998 Mr. Drabinsky was Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of Livent Inc., the only publicly traded commercial live theatre company. Under Mr. Drabinsky's producing leadership, the corporation's Broadway productions were nominated for 61 Tony Awards and have collectively won 19 Tony Awards, including "Best Musical" for "Kiss of the Spider Woman" and "Fosse" and "Best Musical Revival" for "Show Boat."

THEATRE OWNERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

While Chairman of Cineplex Odeon Corporation, Mr. Drabinsky was responsible for restoring the Pantages Theatre to its original 1920's splendour. The landmark 2,200 seat theatre was re-opened in September 1989 with the Canadian production of Andrew Lloyd Webber's acclaimed musical, "The Phantom of the Opera."

In December 1995, the new 1,849 seat Ford Centre for the Performing Arts in Vancouver, designed by the Canadian-Israeli architect, Moshe Safdie, opened with the Pacific Northwest premiere of "Show Boat." Owned and managed by Livent, the Centre was the first theatre that Livent has built from inception and the first to be located outside Toronto.

Under Mr. Drabinsky's supervision, Livent's wholly owned subsidiary, Livent (U.S.) Inc., acquired and restored Chicago's historic Oriental Theatre which was completed in the fall of 1998. The Oriental, operating under the name The Ford Center for the Performing Arts, seats 2,180. In New York, Livent (U.S.) Inc. created a new 1,839 seat Broadway theatre, also operating under the name The Ford Center for the Performing Arts, on the site of the legendary Lyric and Apollo (also known as the Academy) Theatres. The new theatre is located

on the west side of 42nd Street just west of Times Square and opened in December 1997 with the Broadway production of "Ragtime."

MUSICAL PRODUCTIONS

Under Mr. Drabinsky's creative leadership, Livent established a strong association with theatrical composer Andrew Lloyd Webber and his organization, The Really Useful Group. Livent's productions of Sir Lloyd Webber's musicals included "The Phantom of the Opera," the longest running musical in Canadian theatre history. This production opened in 1989 and is now in its tenth year of performances at the Pantages Theatre in Toronto.

Other musicals written by Andrew Lloyd Webber and produced by Livent include a new production of "Aspects of Love," restaged in 1992 by director Robin Phillips, the North American premiere stagings from 1990 to 1992, of "The Music of Andrew Lloyd Webber In Concert"; the 1992 North American premiere production of "Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat starring Donny Osmond, which broke records on tour in Canada and the United States; the Canadian premiere of the composer's Tony Award-winning, "Sunset Boulevard," starring Diahann Carroll, which opened in October 1995 at the Ford Centre in Metropolitan Toronto, and a newly conceived concert production, "Andrew Lloyd Webber Music of the Night," originally starring Colm Wilkinson, which had its Canadian world premier in 1995.

Livent also produced the international award-winning musical version of "Kiss of the Spider Woman," directed by Harold Prince, with a book by Terrence McNally and score of John Kander and Fred Ebb. Following its world premiere in Toronto in June 1992, "Kiss" moved to the Shaftesbury Theatre in London's West End, winning the 1992 London Evening Standard Drama Award for "Best Musical," before opening on Broadway where it was honoured with seven 1993 Tony Awards including "Best Musical" and was the recipient of the 1993 New York Drama Desk, New York Drama Critics' Circle and 1994 New York Outer Critics' Circle Awards for "Best Musical."

Mr. Drabinsky's creative collaboration with legendary Broadway director, Harold Prince, which began with "The Phantom of the Opera" and "Kiss of the Spider Woman," continued with Livent's critically acclaimed production of the Jerome Kern/Oscar Hammerstein II musical classic, "Show Boat." Following its world premiere in October 1993 in Metropolitan Toronto at the Ford Centre and a successful 20-month engagement there, a second "Show Boat" company opened to unanimous critical praise on Broadway on October 2, 1994 at the Gershwin Theatre, setting several new records including one for the highest Broadway advance earned by a re-creation/revival and another for the highest weekly box office gross. "Show Boat" became the most honoured Broadway show of the 1994-95 season, winning, among its numerous awards, five 1995 Tonys, including "Best Musical Revival." It also received five 1995 New York Drama Desk Awards, including "Outstanding Revival of a Musical." In January 1997, "Show Boat" closed on Broadway after playing to 1.5 million theatregoers and earning a record-breaking box office gross of US \$103 million.

In April 1997, Livent mounted a new Broadway production of Leonard Bernstein's "Candide," at the Gershwin Theatre, with director Harold Prince combining his landmark 1973 environmental staging with his most recent operatic interpretation, presented by the Lyric Opera of Chicago in 1994. "Candide" received four Tony Award nominations and won the 1997 Tony Award for "Best Costume Design."

Livent's new musical, Ragtime, based on E.L. Doctorow's modern classic novel, received its world premiere in December 1996 at the Ford Centre in Metropolitan Toronto. The production, the first Mr. Drabinsky and Livent developed from inception, was directed by Frank Galati with book by Terrence McNally and musical score by Lynn Ahrens and Stephen Flaherty. A second company of "Ragtime" opened in Los Angeles in June 1997. "Ragtime" opened in previews on Broadway on December 26, 1997, and had its official opening on January 18, 1998 as the inaugural production of Livent's new Ford Center for the Performing Arts on 42nd Street.

Other works developed by Mr. Drabinsky include a musical adaptation of the 1957 breakthrough, film noir drama, "The Sweet Smell of Success," with a score by Marvin Hamlisch and lyrics by Craig Carnelia and book by John Guare; an original musical entitled "Parade," directed by Harold Prince with a book by Alfred Uhry, Oscar and Pulitzer-Prize winning author of "Driving Miss Daisy," and score by composer, Jason Robert Brown which premiered November 9, 1998 in New York and received 9 Tony Award nominations and 2 Tony Awards as well as the 1998 Drama Desk Award for Best Musical, and the New York Drama Critics Circle Award for Best Musical; and a restoration of the Rodgers and Hart musical classic, "Pal Joey," with a new book by Terrence McNally. Livent also acquired the rights to the works of Dr. Seuss with plans to develop a new Broadway musical called, "The Seussical."

As well, Livent acquired the worldwide rights to produce a musical featuring choreographic works created by the legendary Bob Fosse. The production was directed by Richard Maltby, Jr., Gwen Verdon and Anne Reinking and choreographed by Ms. Reinking and was the recipient of three 1998 Tony Awards including Best Musical.

Mr. Drabinsky was instrumental in Livent aligning itself with three of Canada's most distinguished cultural institutions; the Stratford Festival, the Canadian Opera Company and the National Ballet of Canada. In September 1996, Livent produced, in association with the Stratford Festival, "Barrymore," an original one-man portrait of John Barrymore by acclaimed playwright, William Luce, starring Christopher Plummer. Following its Stratford engagement, "Barrymore" began a North American tour, produced exclusively by Livent. "Barrymore" opened on Broadway at the Music Box Theatre in March 1997 and Mr. Plummer received the Tony Award, Drama Desk Award, and Outer Critics Circle Award for "Best Actor in a Play" for his portrayal of John Barrymore.

In 1997 Livent presented, for the first time, a series of concerts by the Canadian Opera Company Orchestra and Chorus, with distinguished solists including the internationally acclaimed Canadian tenor, Ben Heppner, at the George Weston Recital Hall in the Ford Centre in Metropolitan Toronto.

Also in 1997, Livent presented the National Ballet of Canada's production of Karen Kain's Farewell Tour across Canada.

In addition to producing musicals, Livent programmed five full seasons of concerts and recitals by the world's most illustrious musicians and most sought-after performing artists in Metropolitan Toronto at the Ford Centre's George Weston Recital Hall. The programming encompassed Jazz, African-American music, blues and light classical repertoire.

In the spring of 2001, Mr. Drabinsky presented Athol Fugard's critically acclaimed play *The Island* in Toronto on behalf of the Royal National Theatre of London and the Market Theatre of Johannesburg. *The Island* won the 2001/2002 Dora Mavor Moore Award for Outstanding Production of a Play.

Mr. Drabinsky is an avid collector and supporter of Canadian contemporary art and owns The Drabinsky Gallery located in Toronto's Yorkville district, dedicated to the presentation and promotion of contemporary Canadian and American art.

An Officer of the Order of Canada, Mr. Drabinsky is an ardent spokesman on behalf of interracial understanding and individual liberty. In July 1995 Mr. Drabinsky addressed the Canadian Institute for Advanced Legal Studies at the University of Cambridge in England on the topic of freedom of artistic expression and the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms as part of the organization's annual Cambridge Lecture Series.

Mr. Drabinsky's autobiography, titled Closer to the Sun, which he co-authored with Governor General's Award finalist Marq de Villiers, was published by McClelland & Stewart in March 1995. It became an immediate best seller, appearing on the Hardcover Non-Fiction lists of prominent national newspapers and magazines including The Toronto Star, The Montreal Gazette, The Ottawa Citizen, The Vancouver Sun, The Winnipeg Free Press, The Calgary Herald, The Edmonton Journal and Maclean's magazine.

In 2003, Mr. Drabinsky was commissioned by Visual Bible International, Inc. to produce the landmark epic *The Gospel of John* for which he re-united with producer Joel B. Michaels. *The Gospel of John* is based word-for-word on the Good News Bible translation of the American Bible Society. Mr. Drabinsky assembled a creative constituency of Academyc, Emmyc and Tonyc Award-winning artists and a committee of esteemed scholars of theology and religion from around the world to create a film with exceptional production values that maintain the integrity of the Biblical work.

In 2007, Mr. Drabinsky created and executive produced *Triple Sensation*, a major performing arts television Series for CBC-TV which aired in October 2007 and received numerous critical acclaims.
